# 2018 International Skills Excellence Forum

WorldSkills Competition Management and Leadership Training Workshop

#### 1.0 Introduction

In September 2014 Zambia was admitted as member **number 71** of WorldSkills International (WSI), an organization that had been established in 1950. The Vision of WSI is: "Improving our world with the power of skills"; while its Mission is: "To raise the profile and recognition of skilled people, and show how important skills are in achieving economic growth and personal success." The flagship programme of WorldSkills International are WorldSkills Competitions held every two (2) years. The competition teams are made up of competitors who are learners from the various pathways of Technical and Vocational Education and Training (TVET) systems. These are prepared for WorldSkills Competitions by combined teams of experts from industry as well as their trainers. The performance standards of WorldSkills Competitions are set at what is termed the "Skills Excellence standard". This is a standard which is far above the national curriculum standards, and approaching industry standards. These standards are set through competition Test projects and related Technical Descriptions designed by industry experts from all participating countries, through internet enabled collaborations. Test project design and performance evaluation is based on the principle of Criterion Referenced Assessment, meaning that performance standards for say Gold Medal, Silver and Bronze Medal in a given competition are pre-set. For countries such as South Korea the integration of a national skills competition system as part of TVET system, through which the country also connects to the WorldSkills Competition system, has provided a very effective link between industry and learning institutions, in that it has provided an experimental platform for practical review and/or adaptation of "imported skills standards", usually associated with imported technology system. Korea's GDP Growth from US\$ 133 in 1966 when the country joined WorldSkills International and held its first national skills competition, to US\$ 27,440 in 2015, is partly attributed to the participation and learning from WorldSkills Competitions; which has mainly been enabled through the **Skilled Crafts Encouragement Act of 1966**.

Establishment of a "National Skills Competition and Career Exploration system", linked to the WorldSkills Competition system, (*Ref. Appendix 1*) is one of the deliverables of Zambia's Seventh National Development Plan (*Ref.: Paragraph 10.4.2*). It is designed to help the country cultivate a sustained pool of internationally competitive skilled persons required to drive the national development aspirations. It is against the foregoing that WorldSkills International, WorldSkills Zambia, and the Zambia Information and Communication and Technology (ZICT) College have partnered to conduct a "WorldSkills Competition Management and Leadership Training Workshop" from 19th to 20th July 2018 to cultivate the human resource pool required to maximize WSI membership benefits for the Zambian industry, learning institutions, and the economy at large. ### 2.0 Training Workshop Objectives:

- To equip policy and technical level participants with the knowledge and skills required to organize and manage a national skills competition system linked to WorldSkills International;
- 2.2 To explore ideas on creation of a "WorldSkills Africa Regional Skills Competition" as one driver for Africa's Agenda 2063; (Ref.: <a href="https://au.int/agenda2063/about">https://au.int/agenda2063/about</a>)
- 3.0 Target Group/Participants (NB. Zambia and the Africa region)
  - a) Policy makers, Education and Skills Development Experts from industry, Learning institutions, professional bodies as well as provincial or regional development investment promoters;
  - b) Policy makers and technocrats involved with skills development as a tool for industrialization and job creation.

The Lead trainer will be **Mr Simon Bartley – President WorldSkills International**. Assisted by a team of local and international WorldSkills Competition Experts.


